




Snow Event Ends This Morning

National Weather Service Decision Support Briefing # 6 Monday, March 4, 2019 3:26 AM

What Has Changed?

- ✓ In general, no significant changes.
- Snowfall increased slightly, now expecting a swath of 6-12 inches from Northern CT – Northern RI – Eastern MA.







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Main Points

Hazard	Impacts	Location	Timing
Heavy Snow	Heavy snow. Scattered power outages possible. Roads snow-covered and slippery.	Heaviest snow mostly likely across RI and central/eastern MA. Limited power outage threat southeast MA and RI.	Heaviest snow through 7 AM. Peak 1-2inch/hour rates through 7 AM

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








Forecast Storm Total Snowfall







Threat Event Summary

- Confidence/Uncertainty: High confidence. The rain/snow line will move north to the U.S.44 corridor...roughly Providence to Plymouth.
- What/Where: Snow with accumulations of 6 to 12 inches across much of

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- the region. Rain south of a line from the South Coast-Cape Cod Canal-Eastham MA moves north slightly this morning. Heaviest snow over interior RI and central/eastern MA.
- Impacts: Heavy, wet snow will cause fallen tree limbs and resulting power outages, especially southeast of Boston to Hartford. Roads will be snow covered and slippery.
 - When: Heavy Snow ends this morning 6-7 AM west, 7-8 AM east. Snow ends 7-10 AM west, 9-11 AM central and east.
