Main Points

Hazard	Impacts	Location	Timing
Heavy Snow	Significant snow accumulations of 8 or more inches possible along with high snowfall rates, resulting in hazardous travel	A significant part of Southern New England will be impacted. Less likely on Cape Cod and the islands	Monday and early Tuesday morning
Strong Winds	Power outages possible along with some downed trees	Eastern MA and RI	Later Monday into Tuesday
Coastal Flood	Widespread minor with pockets of moderate coastal flooding and beach erosion	Eastern Massachusetts coastline including Nantucket	Monday night into Tuesday
Marine	High seas and strong winds will result in dangerous conditions for mariners	MA and RI Coastal Waters	Monday afternoon into Wednesday






Forecast Storm Total Snowfall

Valid: Monday into Tuesday Morning












Forecast Storm Total Snowfall (Best Case)

Low End Amount - 9 in 10 Chance (90%) Of Higher Snowfall Valid: Monday into Tuesday Morning












Forecast Storm Total Snowfall (Worst Case)

High End Amount - 1 in 10 Chance (10%) Of Higher Snowfall Valid: Monday into Tuesday Morning












Forecast Maximum Wind Gusts

Max Wind Gusts (MPH)













Forecast Maximum Wave Heights and Wind Gusts (in kts)













Coastal Flooding – Surge / Inundation

Minor Coastal Flooding

- Widespread minor coastal flooding expected
- Pockets of moderate coastal flooding including structural damage possible
- Vulnerable shore roads with up to a foot of water inundation possible. May be flooding of a few vulnerable basements.
- Some beach erosion with heavy surf.

Timing

Spanning multiple tide cycles, from Monday night into Tuesday

	Storm Surge Threat	Potential Impacts from Storm Surge	
Little to None	0 to 1 feet above ground	No immediate preparations needed. Little to no potential storm surge flooding impacts	
Elevated	1 to 3 feet above ground	To be safe, prepare for the potential of limited storm surge flooding impacts	
Moderate	3 to 6 feet above ground	To be safe, earnestly prepare for the potential of significant storm surge flooding impacts	
High	6 to 9 feet above ground	To be safe, aggressively prepare for the potential of significant storm surge flooding impacts	
Extreme	> 9 feet above ground	To be safe, aggressively prepare for the potential of devastating to catastrophic storm surge flooding impacts	











Threat Event Summary

- ✓ <u>Confidence</u>: High confidence for a winter storm, with greatest uncertainty in total accumulations for locations that will switch to rain.
- ✓ What:



Significant snow across much of southern New England



Strong winds may result in power outages and a few downed trees across eastern MA & RI.



Coastal flooding and beach erosion will be possible along the eastern MA coastline during the high tides Monday night and Tuesday.

- ✓ Where: The potential for significant snow accumulations exists across the entire region, least on Cape Cod and the Islands. The strong wind and coastal flood threat will be maximized across eastern MA & RI.
- ✓ When: Monday Into early Tuesday morning
